The course will survey the recent political-economic and cultural transformations in East Asia, chiefly Japan, South Korea, and China (and to lesser extent Hong Kong and China). The focus will be on criticizing ethnocentric and nationalistic accounts in order to arrive at a more satisfactory transnational and comparative understanding of the region.

If you have no background, then please read Warren Cohen, <u>East Asia at the Center</u>, New York: Columbia University Press, 2001 (available at www.ou.edu/USChina/texts/Cohen2000EastAsiaCenter.pdf) or a similar overview of modern East Asia.

Three things you should note at the outset. First, this is NOT an introductory course. If you know very little about East Asia, then you will either have to catch up very quickly or you will almost surely flounder: unpleasant for you and, for what it's worth, myself as well. Secondly, please note that class participation is 25% of your final grade. Repeated absences will mean 0 (F) for the quarter of your final grade. Finally, class participation means, at the very least, attention to what happens in the classroom. As much as you may fancy yourself a virtuoso of multi-tasking, I take an especially dim view of pupils who pay more attention to their smartphones or laptops than they do to the goings-on in the classroom.
