In the year 2020, the world is in the grip of the Covid-19 crisis. Yet there is a much more devastating disaster on the horizon: the global climate crisis. Some of its consequences are apparent already, including fire and flooding (and the proliferation of pandemics). This course will consider these two crises – and disasters in general – from the standpoint of knowledge and action. Put differently, how aware are we about looming disasters, how do we assess their consequences, and what do we do about them. That is, the course is about knowledge, risk, and action (or ignorance, denial, and inaction).
