The course will survey contemporary political-economic and cultural transformations in Northeast Asia. The focus will be on transcending ethnocentric, nationalistic, and Orientalist accounts in order to arrive at a more satisfactory transnational and comparative understanding of the region.

*Participation* seems subjective, but there are two objective components. First, the desideratum of showing up. Everyone will get one pass on unexcused absence, but four or more unexcused absences will result in F for the course. Second, beyond showing up, you should be there: that is, paying attention. Therefore, although it may seem retrogressive to ban personal electronics (i.e., laptop, smartphone etc.) in the classroom, *no electronics in the classroom*, please.

Examination will be in class. You will be posed a series of short essay questions.

*Project* is an independent research project, though you may work with up to two more people (and will be evaluated collectively). The mode of presentation is open: traditional research paper, video, podcast.

Please beware that I take an extremely dim view of plagiarism, whether the classic sort (copying another person's work) or its contemporary permutation (relying on generative AI).
